ASHLAND LAKES TIMBER SALE POSTPONED

In the September issue of Signpost, it was reported that the Ashland Lakes timber sale had been postponed. According to Dale Thompson, of the Sedro Wooley Office of the DNR, "the DNR will be reconsidering the size and configuration of the clearcuts and make a new proposal no sooner than a year from now." Thompson felt that the two dozen letters criticizing the terms of the sale "made us think that we had overlooked something."

Thank you to those of you who wrote letters and thank you to <u>Signpost</u> for the excellent coverage on the clearcut proposal and their attendance at hearings. Letters do make a difference.

However, the sale will be proposed again. We must no forget the threat to this beautiful area. Sionpost has suggested that a citizens group be formed to propose a change in the legislative mandate to the DNR. In the view of the present administration, headed by Land Commissioner Bert Cole, this mandate means all state land will be clear cut within 20 years. This also applies to the proposed Classic U sale on Whidbey Island. PROTECTION ISLAND

All of you who attended the September meeting were impressed by Eleanor Stopps efforts to get Protection Island established as a wildlife sanctuary. Those of you who did not attend missed a superb meeting. Unfortunately the bill to make Protection Island a wildlife refuge did not pass before Congress recessed. Write Rep. Swift or Rep. Pritchard urging their support. Protection Island is under extensive attack at the moment. The DNR is asking for bids to harvest goeducs with high pressure water hoses and two sites are quite close to Protection Island — one is 500 feet from shore. The noise will disrupt the harbor seal pupping grounds. In addition. there would be a large marker put up next to the pigeon guillemot nesting area. The PAS Board voted to sent \$50.00 to help purchase a lot on the island. Any of you who would like to contribute for this lot purchase prooram, please mail it to the Chapter box by October 17 or bring it with you to the meeting and we will forward the entire amount. Kitsap Audubon pledged arid made enough to buy one lot. Do we want to try-

MEET THE CANDIDATES


